2. Faith -

1. Believe on him whom he hath

trust him. Abandonment to truth -
to Christ.
2. Unbelief which robs one of peace,
power, & keeps him from coming
to Christ is not intellectual but
refusal to believe on his
word.

3. Obedience -

1. Issues out of genuine
repentance. To do his
will. Do what a Christian
should do.
